### ANGRY AT FATHER; WOULD END LIFE

#### Harwood Schuck Had Acid Bottle in Possession POISON WRESTED FROM HIM

Father, Alarmed at Threat, Calls Up  
on Police for Aid—Court  
Lectures Boy.

Because his father scolded him and threatened to have him arrested Harwood Schuck, aged 19, a son of Fred Schuck, 381 Western avenue, threatened to end his life, his intention being frustrated when the police took him into custody at 7 o'clock this morning.

According to the story told by the father and son in justice court this morning, the boy quarreled with his father this morning and left the house declaring his intention to end his life. His father, alarmed, notified the police, who after a search, located the boy at the Schanrock plumbing shop on Western avenue.

The police claim that the boy, who has been employed at the Schanrock shop, picked up a bottle of muriatic acid and that some one in the shop, noting that he was laboring under some great stress of emotion, took the bottle from him. When questioned in justice court, the boy admitted that he had the bottle in his possession and that it had been wrested from him.

Justice Blewett gave the boy a severe lecture, warning him that if he did not walk the "straight and narrow path" he would have to reckon with the law," and then allowed him to go upon his promise to go to work and behave himself.

The Schuck boy was arrested a year ago in company with a companion, charged with an assault with a dangerous weapon, Fred Schave, a farmer, making the complaint. The boys were bound over to circuit court and are to have their case disposed of at the November term.

**Moore Must Pay Penalty.**  
Al. Moore, colored, who escaped from the county workhouse where he was serving a ninety day sentence for drawing a gun on a man named Snyder, was brought back from Bear Dam Sunday by Sheriff Graham. Moore stoutly maintained that a mistake had been made, that he was not the man wanted, but letters in his pockets addressed to "Al. Moore, workhouse," established his identity. Moore will be arraigned on a charge of breaking jail and will have to spend six months in jail for the offense.

### PELTON HOUSE SOLD

Martin Peterson Acquires Property  
on South Main Street Left by  
Philander Pelton.

The residence and property of the late Philinda Pelton, located at 363 South Main street, was sold at administrator's sale this morning at the court house to Martin Peterson, for the sum of \$1,425. The sale was conducted by H. G. Pelton, of Oshkosh, while E. P. Worthing acted as attorney in the matter. There were four or five bidders anxious to secure the property but the bidding was suddenly stopped at \$1,425, which is considered a fair price for the property. Mrs. Pelton in her will left bequests to relatives amounting to about \$1,400, and the sale of the property was necessary to meet these bequests.

Mrs. Pelton was a sister-in-law of Francis Pelton, of Hutchinson, Minn., who was in the city today to attend the sale. Mr. Pelton is now in his eighty-second year, his last birthday occurring August 28, 1912. He has been a subscriber to the Commonwealth for sixty years having become a reader of the paper in 1854. Mr. Pelton is in good health, and he says he enjoys reading the Commonwealth as much as ever.

# ENTHRONEMENT WAS IMPRESSIVE AFFAIR

## Rt. Rev. Reginald Heber Weller Takes Episcopal Throne at St. Paul's Cathedral--A Beautiful and Solemn Ceremonial

### PEOPLE THROG CATHEDRAL FOR THE SERVICE

#### Archdeacons Rogers, of Fond du Lac. and Campbell Install Successor to Bishop Grafton--An Able Sermon is Delivered

The installing and enthroning of the Rt. Rev. Reginald Heber Weller, D. D., as Bishop of Fond du Lac, took place with an impressive ceremonial previous to the office of the Holy Eucharist at St. Paul's Cathedral Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock. The service of installation, though brief, was featured by a beautiful and impressive ceremony. As the tolling of the chimes in the Cathedral ceased at 10:30 o'clock, Bishop Weller, accompanied by Rev. Fr. Walters of Menasha and Rev. Fr. Thorne of Oneida, as chaplains and Canon Frank A. Sanborn of this city as

master of ceremonies, left the Episcopal residence at the corner of Division and Sophia streets and walked to the main entrance of the Cathedral.

At the same time the Cathedral choir, acolytes, thurifers, cross bearers, lay members of the Cathedral chapter, members of the standing committee of the diocese, the Cathedral clergy and preacher marched from the robing room across the front of the nave to the west aisle and thence to the back of the nave, where the procession halted. Applies for Admission. It was then that Bishop Weller, robed in his Episcopal habit and attended by his chaplains approached the doors leading into the Cathedral. Upon reaching the doors, which were closed, Bishop Weller raised his crozier and rapped three times upon the door. Archdeacon B. Talbot Rogers who with Archdeacon Campbell of Oconto, was waiting on the inside of the Cathedral, called out: "Who comes here."

Bishop Weller responded: "The Bishop of Fond du Lac." whereupon Archdeacon Rogers opened the doors and bade the bishop enter.

March to the Chancel.  
The entire procession began the march to the chancel and sanctuary the choir singing "Onward Christian Soldiers." Upon arrival at the sanctuary the archdeacons conducted the bishop and his chaplains to the altar, where all knelt in silent prayer.

Offers His Letters.  
Bishop Weller then arose and turning to the archdeacons proffered to them his "letters," or credentials, saying:

"Venerable Sirs, We present unto you these our letters." The Archdeacon of Oconto then read the letters, one of which was from the Chapter of the Cathedral and in confirmation of Bishop Weller's consecration and the other of a similar nature from the Episcopal bishops present at the consecration.

Archdeacon Rogers then said: "We receive these letters with great wil-

lingness and will show our regard to them upon your making the Declaration of Fidelity customary in this behalf."

Bishop Weller then replied: "In the Name of God, Amen. I, Reginald Bishop of the Church in Fond du Lac, do promise conformity and obedience to the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Church in the United States of America and the constitution of the Diocese of Fond du Lac. So help me God, through Jesus Christ."

Is Conducted to Throne.  
After this declaration the most solemn act of the service took place,

## SEEK DAMAGES FOR LOSS OF STEAM TUG

### United States Marshal Defendant in Shipping Case

#### NEGLIGENCE IS CHARGED

Owners of the Steam Tug "Kate Williams" Ask \$30,000 for  
Damage to the Boat.

An interesting lawsuit growing out of the attachment of a steam tug by Deputy United States Marshal H. A. Weil has been brought to Fond du Lac county from Milwaukee for trial. The plaintiffs in the case are Amelia and Ethel Martin, who are suing Mr. Weil and his bonding company for \$30,000 damages because of the destruction of the tug "Kate Williams" on Lake Michigan on Sept. 29, 1907. The complaint states that Mr. Weil's negligence in failing to man the boat properly after he had seized it was responsible for the tug drawing her moorings and being cast upon the rocks on one of the islands off Washington Bay in Door county.

The "Kate Williams" was a ten ton boat and was licensed on Lake Michigan, Lake Huron and the Straits of Mackinac. On August 26, 1907, Mr. Weil levied on the tug under a monition and attachment in a libel, in which John Hayes was libellant. At the time of the levy the tug was off Jackson harbor and was manned by a crew of six men.

The complaint alleges that Mr. Weil ordered the boat to be moored and appointed Robert Martin custodian. Later on it is alleged that the supply of fuel gave out, and that the custodian notified the marshal of this fact and that the boat was in danger of being driven upon the rocks. It is alleged that a letter to this effect was sent the marshal on Sept. 14, 1907. On September 29 following the tug drifted before a gale and was washed upon the rocks of an island causing the wreck. The tug was wrecked. The case will probably come to trial in November.

At the time of the seizure it is alleged Mr. Weil was under a bond of \$20,000 furnished by the Fidelity and Deposit company, of Maryland.

#### A CORRECTION.

Michael Goyke, of Van Dyne, asks the Commonwealth to make a correction in the article published last Tuesday, in which it was stated that he had served three terms in the Fond du Lac county jail. Mr. Goyke states that he has served but one term in the Fond du Lac county jail and that was for only fifteen days, not ninety days, as stated in the article mentioned.

Bishop Weller, accompanied by the two archdeacons left the sanctuary while the introit was being sung, returning after a few minutes' absence to begin the office of the Holy Eucharist. Bishop Weller acted as celebrant of the mass with Archdeacon Rogers as deacon and Archdeacon Campbell as sub-deacon.

Enthronement Sermon Given.

The sermon was delivered by Rev. Howard B. St. George, B. A., professor of Ecclesiastical history at Neshotah house. Father St. George is a graduate of Trinity college, Dublin, and a learned scholar and brilliant speaker. His sermon which appears on another page was listened to with marked interest by the large congregation.

The Cathedral choir sang King Hall's mass during the office of the Holy Eucharist. In addition several hymns and anthems were given. The members of the Cathedral chapter who participated in the service were Benjamin Wild, Carroll R. Burnton, Matthew Mitchell and H. R. Potter. The members of the standing committee present were J. B. Perry and E. R. Herren.
